

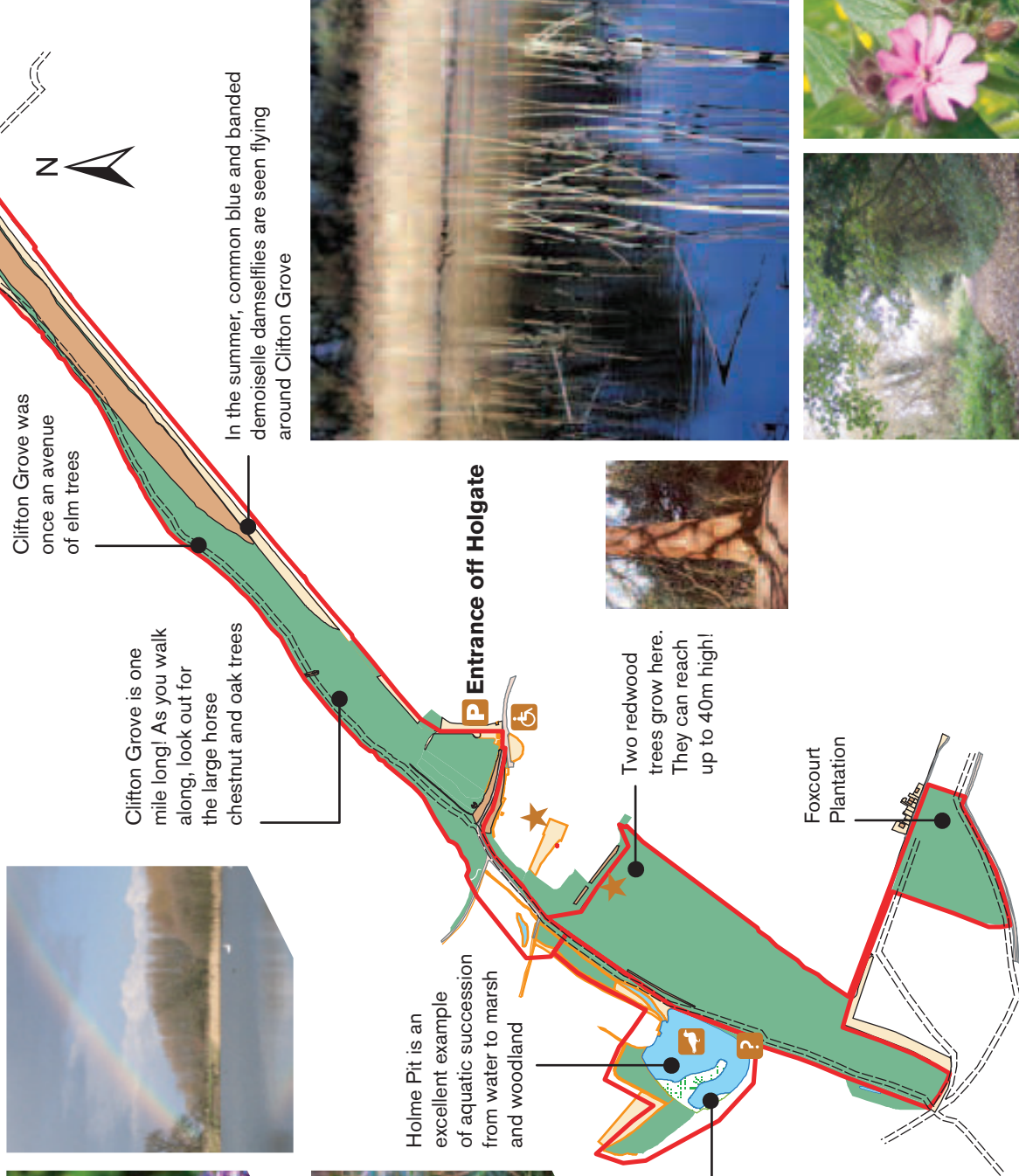
Holme Pit

Get closer to nature



Entrance via Fabis Drive. Here you can look over at the River Trent and maybe spot fishing herons



Clifton Grove is one mile long! As you walk along, look out for the large horse chestnut and oak trees

Clifton Grove was once an avenue of elm trees

In the summer, common blue and banded demoiselle damselflies are seen flying around Clifton Grove

Holme Pit is an excellent example of aquatic succession from water to marsh and woodland

Two redwood trees grow here. They can reach up to 40m high!

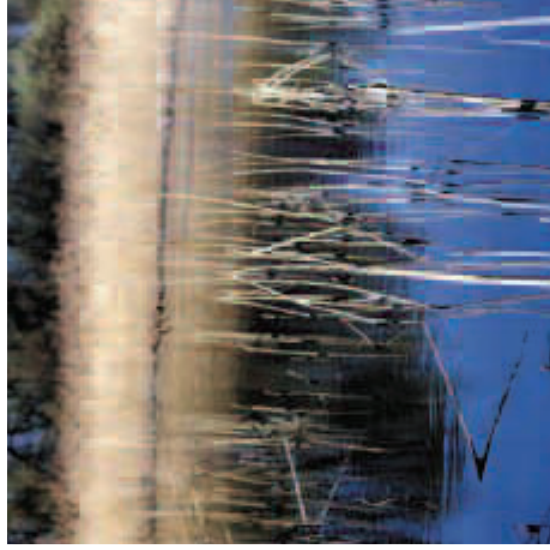


Keep an eye and ear out for the green woodpeckers!

This historic grove is thought to have been used by residents of Clifton Hall.

Along with oak, beech, sycamore and birch, Clifton Woods has been planted with unusual sequoia and oaks. The ground flora includes yellow archangel and dogs mercury, suggesting it is an ancient woodland.

Access can be gained from the A453 (Clifton Lane) through Clifton village along Village Road. There is a car park at Holgate.
