Am I eligible to register?

If you are a British citizen living abroad, you can apply to be an overseas voter.

As long as you were registered to vote as a resident in the UK (or deemed to have been resident in the UK, for example by being registered as a service voter) within the last 15 years, you can register to vote from overseas. If you were too young to register when you left the UK, your parent or guardian must have been registered.

Who is eligible to register to vote?

You can register to vote in the UK if you are:

- a British citizen living abroad, and
- aged 16 or over (although you won't be able to vote until you are 18).

Can I vote in all elections in the UK?

As an overseas voter, you are eligible to vote in elections for the UK Parliament and the European Parliament. You cannot vote in UK local or mayoral elections or elections to the Scottish Parliament, the National Assembly for Wales or the Mayor of London and London Assembly.

If you live in a country which is a member of the European Union, you can vote in that country's own local and European parliamentary elections, but you cannot vote in European elections in more than one country.

How do I register to vote?

Other information

The open register

There are two registers. Why?

Using information received from the public, registration officers keep two registers – the electoral register and the open register (also known as the edited register).

The electoral register

The electoral register lists the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in public elections. The register is used for electoral purposes, such as making sure only eligible people can vote. It is also used for other limited purposes specified in law, such as:

- detecting crime (e.g. fraud)
- calling people for jury service
- · checking credit applications.

The open register

The open register is an extract of the electoral register, but is not used for elections. It can be bought by any person, company or organisation. For example, it is used by businesses and charities to confirm name and address details.

Your name and address will be included in the open register unless you ask for them to be removed. Removing your details from the open register does not affect your right to vote.

When we receive your form

- If we need more information for example, about your parent or guardian – we will contact you.
- ▶ If you are eligible, we will send you confirmation that you are on the electoral register. If you are aged 16 or 17, we will let you know when you are on the register.

Your personal information

We will only use the information you give us for electoral purposes. We will look after personal information securely and we will follow the Data Protection Act 1998. We will not give personal information about you and the other people in your household to anyone else or another organisation unless we have to by law.
